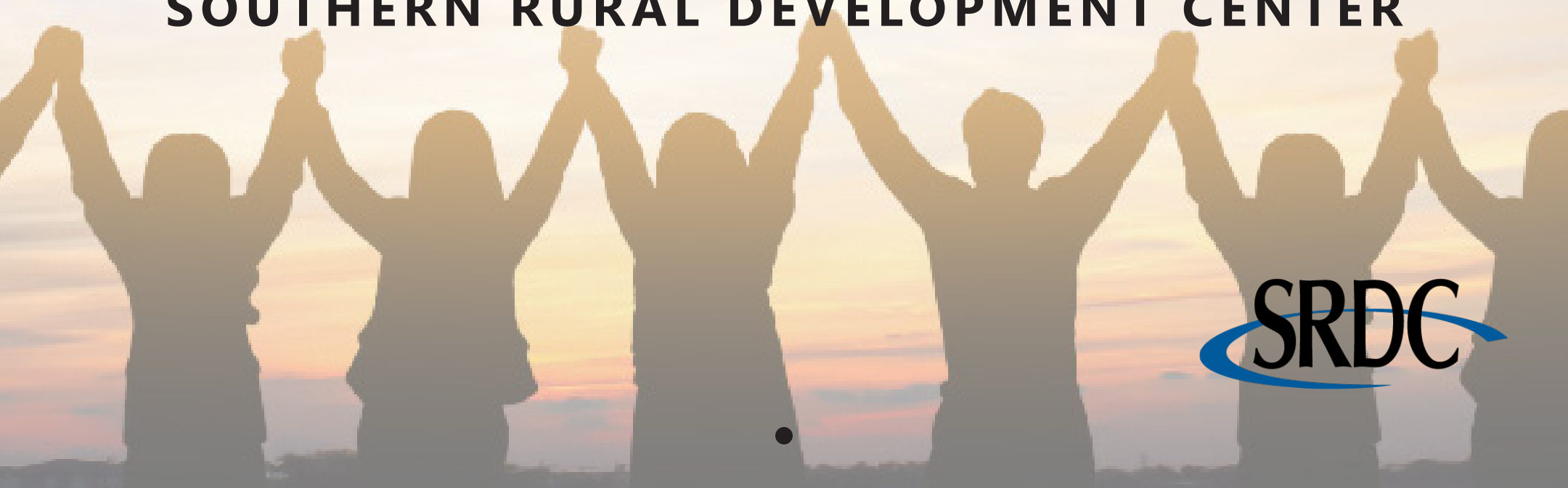

Digital Divide

What is Rural Economic Development (RED)? Agriculture, business, and rural communities are working to revitalize digital access. Digital equity means all individuals have digital resources readily needed for full participation in our society and economy. Digital equity is essential for economic stability and quality of life. The project's goal is to identify and address digital equity challenges facing socio-economically disadvantaged (SED) communities in the Southern Region. The research identifies unique challenges facing these communities along with the capacity of the SED Extension Service to respond.



**Heirs' Property**

The USDA defines heirs' property as land that has been passed down informally, from generation to generation. In most cases, it involves individuals who sold or died and their property's land passed "to common" to all of the heirs, regardless of whether they live on the land, pay the taxes, or have ever set foot on the land. Geographic areas heavily impacted include Appalachia, Louisiana of South West, Mississippi River Delta Region, Native American Tribal lands, and Southern Coastal Region (Shirley Bell Region).



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

# Building Capacity to Address Heirs' Property Issues

## Extension/Outreach

Understanding Heirs' Property at the Community Level is a train-the-trainer workshop designed to build capacity among Extension/outreach professionals to help families take initial steps into preventing or resolving heirs' property issues.

The achievements since training commenced in November 2022 are as follows:

- 6 Train-the-trainer workshops conducted
- 156 Extension/outreach professionals trained
- 32 States sending team members to training

Based on 156 participants' evaluation of the train-the-trainer workshops:

- 97% Have new knowledge concerning heirs' property
- 98% Know where to find resources to help with heirs' property
- 98% Feel knowledgeable enough to take this information back to help communities

## Top 5 topic areas where participants reported the highest knowledge gained:

Why heirs' property exists

The importance of working with family members

Impacts of heirs' property

Identifying heirs' property

How tax sales and partition sales can lead to land loss

## Research Accomplishments include:

- Provide leadership on the USDA AFRI-funded project entitled, "The Racial Wealth Gap, Persistent Poverty, and Heirs' Property" with research to inform Extension programming.
- Partnered with the Southern Rural Sociological Association for a special issue of the Journal of Rural Social Sciences focused on heirs' property and an associated Issue Brief.

# COLLABORATIONS THAT WORK

# Building Digital Skill Capacity

Over Spring 2023, the Southern Rural Development Center worked alongside the National Digital Education Extension Team/ECOP Broadband and Digital Access Program Action Team, to conduct a national survey to determine which digital skills are most needed by community members from the perspectives of Extension professionals across all program areas. With 659 total responses collected online via a Qualtrics questionnaire, this survey sets a foundation for developing materials to address the digital skills needs of the populations Extension reaches. The Digital Volunteer Initiative is in direct response to these needs, with lessons addressing each of these topics. The top three categories of skills needed along with the specific competencies within each are listed below.



## Safe and Effective Internet Use

- Cyber security, attacks, and scams
- Digital media literacy: accessing, evaluating, using & distributing information credibly, safely, and ethically
- Internet privacy and security, passwords, and sharing information online
- Accessing and navigating the Internet



## Computer/Digital Device Basics

- Hardware and software basics
- Using a smartphone
- Saving and recovering data: file movement and management
- Downloading and installing applications

- Social media savvy
- Video conferencing

## 2023 Bonnie Teater Award Recipient: Matthew J. Ulmer



Dr. Ulmer's tenure in Extension community research development began in 2015 as a Family Resource Management and Workforce Development Specialist. In 2018, Dr. Ulmer's responsibilities shifted to Community Resource Development to work collaboratively with the 67 Extension Coordinators to address the most pressing challenges facing the state. As the lead for the Alabama Extension Community Development Priority Team, Dr. Ulmer develops strategies to implement new and existing Extension programs, provides training to County Extension Coordinators, and secures and manages extramural funding opportunities. Dr. Ulmer's professional contributions have generated numerous impacts at the local, regional, and state levels. His grantsmanship has yielded over \$1.5 million.

His focus areas in Extension and outreach activities are on workforce development, tourism, leadership, civic engagement, and youth career development where he works with other Extension personnel to develop curricula in agritourism, job success, and financial literacy.

Outside of extramurally funded initiatives, Dr. Ulmer's applied policy research informed changes to Alabama's workforce development system and provided significant insights to many chamber and economic development authorities through needs assessment and strategic planning efforts.

Overall Dr. Ulmer's body of work in the field of community development demonstrates the spirit of this prestigious award. Therefore, it is most fitting that Dr. Matthew Ulmer be honored as the Southern Rural Development Center 2023 recipient of the Bonnie Teater Community Development Early Career Achievement Award.

The number of participants in each group are depicted below.

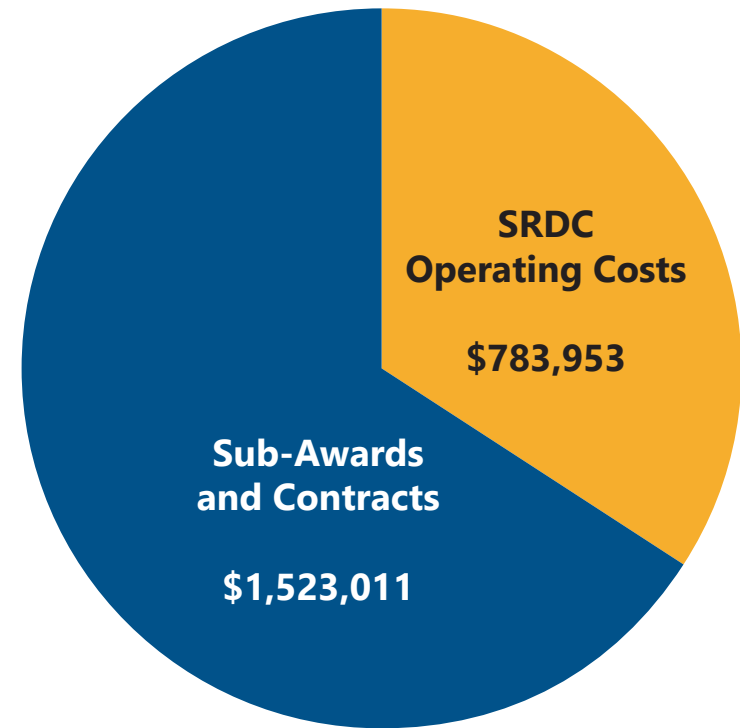
